Location




Chesterfield County is located in east-central Virginia on the Interstate 95 corridor between the city of Richmond to the north and Petersburg and Colonial Heights to the south. The city of Hopewell is located southeast of the county. Chesterfield is one of Virginia's largest communities due to a robust and diversified economy, a highly-skilled labor force, and an expanding highway and transportation network. The aggressive road building posture taken by the county has helped spawn a significant increase in its inventory of available commercial and industrial properties.

Washington, D.C. is approximately 110 miles north, and Norfolk is 85 miles east.

Chesterfield County is part of the Richmond Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA).

Chesterfield County lies in east-central Virginia between the City of Richmond to the north, and the Petersburg-Colonial Heights area to the south and is situated on Interstates 95, 295 and 895, and the beltway Route 288 provides easy access to I-64 and I-85.





Government and Taxes

Government

Chesterfield County has a County Administrator and a five-member Board of Supervisors.

The county has a comprehensive plan and zoning and subdivision ordinances.

Chesterfield is the county seat. There are no incorporated towns within the county.

Chesterfield maintains a AAA bond rating.

Taxes

Localities in Virginia collect a 1% sales tax. They do not tax other items taxed at the State level.

Counties and cities in Virginia are separate taxing entities. Therefore, a company pays taxes to either a county or to a city.

If a company is located in a town, it pays town and county taxes except for utility taxes which are paid only to the town and the license tax which is paid only to the town unless town law permits the additional collection of a county tax.

Manufacturers pay real estate, machinery and tools, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes.

Nonmanufacturers pay real estate, tangible personal property, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes. They also may pay either a merchants' capital or a license tax.

Community Facilities

Chesterfield County residents are only minutes away from any of the metropolitan area's medical facilities. The American Medical Association has designated the area as a prime medical center, a designation given only to cities where every type of medical care and surgery is provided. There are more than 3,500 physicians and 17 acute care and specialty hospitals with nearly 4,000 staffed beds.

The Chesterfield County Library System consists of a main library and eight branches. Approximately 1.9 million visitors use the county facilities that have an annual circulation of nearly 3.5 million items. Reciprocal agreements with neighboring library systems allow residents to be in touch with the vast collections available in the area. Libraries at eight area colleges and universities are also accessible to the public.

More than 750 churches and synagogues are located in the region. The predominant denomination is Baptist, but congregations representing all major Protestant, Catholic, Greek Orthodox, and Mennonite faiths are active.

Chesterfield residents can take advantage of a vast assortment of retail shops. From regional malls such as Chesterfield Towne Center, complete with national and regional department stores and specialty chain stores to neighborhood convenience marts, shopping choices are virtually unlimited. Over 30 shopping centers are located in the county along with additional retail and commercial expansion underway.

Chesterfield offers spacious, award-winning communities and neighborhoods conveniently located near quality shopping and dining.

Lifestyle

Chesterfield County contributes significantly to the high level of arts and cultural activities available in the community at large. The John Rolfe Players, a community theater organization, have entertained area residents with their productions for over 35 years. Swift Creek Mill Playhouse, located in a historic mill, is a dinner theater that offers a steady diet of stage plays and musicals. Within the region, theater patrons can enjoy a variety of productions from area organizations such as Theatre Virginia, Theatre IV, and touring Broadway plays and musicals that are presented at the Landmark Theater and the Carpenter Center for the Performing Arts. Musical entertainment is offered by the Richmond Symphony that includes a Masterworks and Pops series, the Sinfonia, the Virginia Opera, and a wealth of choral groups.

The Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, in Richmond, features an extensive collection of world art including the Fabergé collection of Russian Imperial Eggs and the Lewis Collection of Art Nouveau. The Science Museum of Virginia, Valentine Museum, Edgar Allan Poe Museum, and the Museum of the Confederacy reflect Virginia's heritage. The Chesterfield County Museum is located in a reproduction of the original 1749 county courthouse and highlights exhibits on the county's history including its Indian heritage, coal mining, and agriculture. Numerous historic homes and buildings such as Ampthill Estate, Salisbury, and Magnolia Grange are open to the public.

Recreational opportunities in the county are plentiful. Approximately 9,218 acres of public parks and recreational facilities are available for both indoor and outdoor enthusiasts. The county is an ideal location for fishing and water sports as the James and Appomattox Rivers make up much of the county's borders along with the 3,000-acre Lake Chesdin. The County operates 35 parks and athletic complexes and provides extensive instructional and organized sports programming for all age groups. Pocahontas State Park features a swimming pool, boat rentals, hiking trails, camping, horseback riding, and a nature center within its 1,783 acres. Public golf courses, private country clubs, numerous private swim and racquet clubs, and fitness centers complement publicly-provided leisure activities.

The Village of Midlothian has been rated one of the nation's "100 Best Places to Live" by Money Magazine.

The region is home to the Richmond Flying Squirrels, the AA affiliate of the San Francisco Giants baseball team, and Richmond Kickers, a member of the United Soccer Leagues (USL). Two major amusement parks, Busch Gardens in Williamsburg and Kings Dominion in Hanover County, are both less than one hour's drive from Chesterfield and offer exciting rides and entertainment for family. The coastal beaches at Virginia Beach and the famed Blue Ridge Mountains are about a two hour drive from the county, underscoring the convenience of a Chesterfield County location for both work and leisure pursuits.



I. Introduction

The report is divided into three major sections. The first contains a profile of regional demographic characteristics and trends, the second supplies similar information for the regional economy, and the third provides a profile of regional education characteristics.

II. Demographic Profile

Overview

This Demographic Profile provides an in-depth analysis of the population in Chesterfield County. Most of the data is produced by the U.S. Census Bureau, and includes demographic characteristics such as age, race/ethnicity, and gender.



Related Terms and Definitions

Ability to speak English

For people who speak a language other than English at home, the response represents the person's own perception of his or her ability to speak English. Because census questionnaires are usually completed by one household member, the responses may represent the perception of another household member.

Age

The age classification is based on the age of the person in complete years as of April 1, 2010. The age of the person usually was derived from their date of birth information. Their reported age was used only when date of birth information was unavailable.

Gender


The data on gender were derived from answers to a question that was asked of all people. Individuals were asked to mark either "male" or "female" to indicate their gender. For most cases in which gender was not reported, it was determined by the appropriate entry from the person's given (i.e., first) name and household relationship. Otherwise, gender was imputed according to the relationship to the householder and the age of the person.

Race

The concept of race as used by the Census Bureau reflects self-identification by people according to the race or races with which they most closely identify. The categories are sociopolitical constructs and should not be interpreted as being scientific or anthropological in nature. Furthermore, the race categories include both racial and national-origin groups.

Please note: In the past, our population by race/ethnicity data has always excluded the Hispanic ethnicity from each race category. Starting in January 2013, each race category now includes all ethnicities.



Related Terms and Definitions

Average Weekly Wage

Computed as average quarterly wages divided by 13.

Consumer Price Index (CPI)

The Consumer Price Index measures the average change over time in the prices paid by urban consumers for a representative market basket of consumer goods and services.

Local Employment Dynamics (LED)

The Local Employment Dynamics Program at the Census Bureau, together with its state partners, provides employment information at the county, city, and Workforce Investment Area level. This information tracks workers in different industries by age and gender and provides statistics on job creation, separation, turnover, and wages.

Quarterly Census of Employment & Wages (QCEW)

A federal/state cooperative program that collects and compiles employment and wage data for workers covered by state unemployment insurance (UI) laws and the federal civilian workers covered by Unemployment Compensation for Federal Employees (UCFE). These data are maintained at the state in micro and macro levels and also sent to BLS quarterly.

Unemployment Insurance (UI)


Unemployment insurance is a program for the accumulation of funds paid by employers to be used for the payment of unemployment insurance to workers during periods of unemployment which are beyond the workers' control. Unemployment insurance replaces a part of the worker's wage loss if he becomes eligible for payments.









Employment by Industry





New Hires by Industry



Turnover by Industry





Trends







Related Terms and Definitions

Associate's degree

An award that normally requires at least two but less than four years of full-time equivalent college work.

Bachelor's degree

An award that normally requires at least four but not more than five years of full-time equivalent college-level work.

Post-baccalaureate certificate

An award that requires completion of an organized program of study equivalent to 18 semester credit hours beyond the bachelor's. It is designed for persons who have completed a bachelor's degree, but do not meet the requirements of a master's degree.

Master's degree

An award that requires the successful completion of a program of study of at least the full-time equivalent of one but not more than two academic years of work beyond the bachelor's degree.

Post-master's certificate

An award that requires completion of an organized program of study equivalent to 24 semester credit hours beyond the master's degree, but does not meet the requirements of academic degrees at the doctor's level.

Doctor's degree


The highest award a student can earn for graduate study.

First-professional degree

An award that requires completion of a program that meets all of the following criteria: (1) completion of the academic requirements to begin practice in the profession; (2) at least two years of college work prior to entering the program; and (3) a total of at least six academic years of college work to complete the degree program, including prior required college work plus the length of the professional program itself.



Educational Attainment by Age








Technology Zone Incentives

- ♦ A 5-year, 100% tax credit on the increased assessed real property value
- A full or partial exemption of BPOL fees is available for new companies for a 5-year period
- One-time rebate of Business Tangible Personal Property Tax for new businesses at least \$3 million investment
- Reducing costs of connecting to public water and sewer (to be equivalent to a 5/8-inch meter charge)
- Waived cost of site plan review fees, land disturbance permit fees, sign fees, building permit and rezoning fees
- A full or partial rebate of Machinery & Tools tax. Available to new manufacturing companies paying taxes on machinery and equipment that is purchased or leased as part of a new location or expansion
- A "fast-tracked" process to expedite those projects that bring a significant economic impact to the county
