Location




The city of Hopewell is a dynamic riverfront community located at the confluence of the James and Appomattox Rivers. Hopewell has the charm of a small community with convenient access to the amenities of the Richmond metropolitan area. The city is located along Interstate 295 and is easily accessible to Interstates 64, 85, and 95, making it an excellent location to serve the markets of the East and Midwest.

Hopewell is 25 miles southeast of Richmond and 120 miles south of Washington, D.C. The Port of Hampton Roads is 90 miles southeast. Ft. Lee, the home of the Combined Arms Support Command, is located along the city's western edge.

The city of Hopewell is located within the Richmond Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA).

Hopewell is approximately 25 miles southeast of the capital city of Richmond and accessible by both I-295 and I-95.





Government and Taxes

Government

Hopewell has a City Manager and a seven-member City Council.

The city has a comprehensive plan and zoning and subdivision ordinances.

Taxes

Localities in Virginia collect a 1% sales tax. They do not tax other items taxed at the State level.

Counties and cities in Virginia are separate taxing entities. Therefore, a company pays taxes to either a county or to a city.

If a company is located in a town, it pays town and county taxes except for utility taxes which are paid only to the town and the license tax which is paid only to the town unless town law permits the additional collection of a county tax.

Manufacturers pay real estate, machinery and tools, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes.

Nonmanufacturers pay real estate, tangible personal property, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes. They also may pay either a merchants' capital or a license tax.

Community Facilities

Residents of Hopewell have easy access to the 147-bed John Randolph Medical Center, which offers a full range of medical services that include 24-hour emergency care, nuclear medicine, physical therapy, and respiratory care. John Randolph Medical Center was named one of the nation's top performers on key quality measures by the Joint Commission. Southside Regional Medical Center in Petersburg, a 468-bed acute care facility provides extensive facilities and services that include emergency care, surgery, intensive and coronary care, physical rehabilitation, and a school of nursing. There more than 3,500 physicans and 17 acute care and speciality hospitals with approximately 4,000-beds are located in the Richmond area, which has been designated as a prime medical center by the American Medical Association. The designation is giving only to areas where each type of medical care and surgery is provided.

Three long-term care nursing facilities with a total of 248-beds are located in Hopewell that offer rehabilitative and outpatient services. There are an additional twenty-three nursing care facilities located throughout the metropolitan area.

The Hopewell health department provides a wide range of public health care services that include family planning, obstetrics, immunizations and x-ray clinics.

The James and Appomattox rivers provide numerous water related activities for Hopewell residents.

Hopewell is a part of the Appomattox Regional Library System. The main branch of the Appomattox Regional Library System is located in dowtown Hopewell. The This library system circulates 119,561 volumes. Area colleges and universities also open their library facilities to the public. These library facilities include the 64,105-volume collection at Richard Bland College, the 75,472-volume collection at John Tyler Community College, and the 768,818-volume collection at Virginia State University.

There are 35 churches representing the leading Protestant denominations located in Hopewell. Catholic churches and Jewish synagogues can be found in Petersburg and Richmond.

Numerous shopping opportunities are available throughout the metropolitan area. The city of Hopewell has two shopping centers that offer a broad retail mix of department and specialty stores. The newly revitalized downtown area of Hopewell also offers a variety of retail and service-related businesses. As part of the Richmond-Petersburg metropolitan area, city residents enjoy easy access to virtually unlimited shopping choices throughout the area.

Cultural attractions can be found throughout the region including the Virginia Museum for Fine Arts.

Lifestyle

Hopewell and the metropolitan area provide numerous opportunities to pursue historical, cultural and recreational opportunities. Residents, as well as visitors, can enjoy the many homes and sites encountered on the Historic District Walking Tour. The area, first settled in the early 1600's, has played significant roles in both the Revolutionary and Civil Wars. Appomattox Manor, a National Historic Landmark, was used as headquarters by Grant during the Civil War. Hopewell is also the gateway to the historic James River Plantations, which include Brandon, Berkeley, Shirley, Westover, and Evelynton.

The city operates a visitor's center for the convenience of the public.

Cultural attractions in the area include Weston Manor where drama, music and ballet performances are held on the outdoor stage; the Fort Lee Playhouse; and the Swift Creek Mill dinner theater.

Recreational opportunities are also plentiful in Hopewell. The James and Appomattox Rivers offer fishing, boating and swimming. The Hopewell Yacht Club holds several regattas during the year. Both the Yacht Club and Jordan Point Marina offer excellent docking facilities. Jordan Point Country Club has tennis courts, a swimming pool, and an 18-hole golf course. The club opens their golf course to the general public during weekdays.

Public recreational facilities include a full-service community center with competition-sized indoor swimming pool, gymnasium, exercise room, racquetball courts and tennis courts; ten additional tennis courts, seven softball/baseball fields, two community parks, six neighborhood parks, and two multi-purpose parks.

Hopewell's close proximity to Richmond enables residents to enjoy the numerous cultural, historical and entertainment attractions the area has to offer. These attractions include the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, the Virginia Science Museum, and performances by the Virginia Opera, the Richmond Ballet and Theater Virginia.





II. Demographic Profile

Overview

This Demographic Profile provides an in-depth analysis of the population in Hopewell city. Most of the data is produced by the U.S. Census Bureau, and includes demographic characteristics such as age, race/ethnicity, and gender.



Related Terms and Definitions

Ability to speak English

For people who speak a language other than English at home, the response represents the person's own perception of his or her ability to speak English. Because census questionnaires are usually completed by one household member, the responses may represent the perception of another household member.

Age

The age classification is based on the age of the person in complete years as of April 1, 2010. The age of the person usually was derived from their date of birth information. Their reported age was used only when date of birth information was unavailable.

Gender


The data on gender were derived from answers to a question that was asked of all people. Individuals were asked to mark either "male" or "female" to indicate their gender. For most cases in which gender was not reported, it was determined by the appropriate entry from the person's given (i.e., first) name and household relationship. Otherwise, gender was imputed according to the relationship to the householder and the age of the person.

Race

The concept of race as used by the Census Bureau reflects self-identification by people according to the race or races with which they most closely identify. The categories are sociopolitical constructs and should not be interpreted as being scientific or anthropological in nature. Furthermore, the race categories include both racial and national-origin groups.

Please note: In the past, our population by race/ethnicity data has always excluded the Hispanic ethnicity from each race category. Starting in January 2013, each race category now includes all ethnicities.



Related Terms and Definitions

Average Weekly Wage

Computed as average quarterly wages divided by 13.

Consumer Price Index (CPI)

The Consumer Price Index measures the average change over time in the prices paid by urban consumers for a representative market basket of consumer goods and services.

Local Employment Dynamics (LED)

The Local Employment Dynamics Program at the Census Bureau, together with its state partners, provides employment information at the county, city, and Workforce Investment Area level. This information tracks workers in different industries by age and gender and provides statistics on job creation, separation, turnover, and wages.

Quarterly Census of Employment & Wages (QCEW)

A federal/state cooperative program that collects and compiles employment and wage data for workers covered by state unemployment insurance (UI) laws and the federal civilian workers covered by Unemployment Compensation for Federal Employees (UCFE). These data are maintained at the state in micro and macro levels and also sent to BLS quarterly.

Unemployment Insurance (UI)


Unemployment insurance is a program for the accumulation of funds paid by employers to be used for the payment of unemployment insurance to workers during periods of unemployment which are beyond the workers' control. Unemployment insurance replaces a part of the worker's wage loss if he becomes eligible for payments.







New Hires by Industry



Turnover by Industry





Trends







Related Terms and Definitions

Associate's degree

An award that normally requires at least two but less than four years of full-time equivalent college work.

Bachelor's degree

An award that normally requires at least four but not more than five years of full-time equivalent college-level work.

Post-baccalaureate certificate

An award that requires completion of an organized program of study equivalent to 18 semester credit hours beyond the bachelor's. It is designed for persons who have completed a bachelor's degree, but do not meet the requirements of a master's degree.

Master's degree

An award that requires the successful completion of a program of study of at least the full-time equivalent of one but not more than two academic years of work beyond the bachelor's degree.

Post-master's certificate

An award that requires completion of an organized program of study equivalent to 24 semester credit hours beyond the master's degree, but does not meet the requirements of academic degrees at the doctor's level.

Doctor's degree


The highest award a student can earn for graduate study.

First-professional degree

An award that requires completion of a program that meets all of the following criteria: (1) completion of the academic requirements to begin practice in the profession; (2) at least two years of college work prior to entering the program; and (3) a total of at least six academic years of college work to complete the degree program, including prior required college work plus the length of the professional program itself.



Educational Attainment by Age



(Population 18 years and over)





