


### Location



Surry County is located in southeastern Virginia. This 306 square mile county is bounded on the north by the James River. Surry County's close proximity to major military, naval and research centers makes it an ideal location for contractor facilities.

Surry County is 50 miles southeast of Richmond, the state capital, and 176 miles south of Washington, D.C. The Port of Hampton Roads is 40 miles southeast.

Strategically located in southeastern Virginia, Surry is 10 miles south of Williamsburg, 50 miles southeast of Richmond and 40 miles northwest of Norfolk.





### **Government and Taxes**

#### Government

Surry County has a County Administrator and a five-member Board of Supervisors.

The county has a comprehensive plan and zoning and subdivision ordinances.

Surry is the county seat. Claremont and Dendron are other incorporated towns within the county.

#### **Taxes**

Localities in Virginia collect a 1% sales tax. They do not tax other items taxed at the State level.

Counties and cities in Virginia are separate taxing entities. Therefore, a company pays taxes to either a county or to a city.

If a company is located in a town, it pays town and county taxes except for utility taxes which are paid only to the town and the license tax which is paid only to the town unless town law permits the additional collection of a county tax.

Manufacturers pay real estate, machinery and tools, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes.

Nonmanufacturers pay real estate, tangible personal property, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes. They also may pay either a merchants' capital or a license tax.

# **Community Facilities**

Surry County is served by the Surry Medical Center which provides full-time primary care to the area. Surry County residents generally utilize the hospital facilities in Williamsburg, Petersburg, Hopewell, Suffolk, and Newport News. Williamsburg Community Hospital, a 139-bed facility, offers a full range of medical services that include surgery and 24-hour emergency care. Southside Regional Medical Center in Petersburg with 468 beds and John Randolph Hospital in Hopewell with 150 beds are acute care medical centers providing emergency care, surgery, intensive and coronary care and physical rehabilitation. In addition to these facilities, the nearby Norfolk-Virginia Beach-Newport News metropolitan area has 15 acute care medical centers with over 4,000 beds which offer the latest technology, services and facilities.

The public health department, located near the town of Surry, offers countywide medical services.

Surry County is a member of the Walter C. Rawls Regional Library System. This regional library circulates 120,754 volumes. Branches of this library system are located in the towns of Surry and Claremont and house 6,000 volumes. Area colleges and universities also open their library facilities to the public. These facilities include libraries at William and Mary College with a 1,598,035 volume collection; Virginia State University with a 768,818 collection; and Old Dominion University with a 1,400,246 volume collection.

A new state-of-the-art regional family practice medical facility was opened in 2008.

There are 35 churches representing the leading Protestant denominations and the Catholic faith located in Surry County. A Jewish synagogue can be found in Petersburg.

Over 50 retail and service-related establishments provide for the immediate shopping needs of county residents. These businesses offer a broad mix of grocery, hardware and specialty stores. The county's close proximity to Williamsburg, Petersburg, Richmond, and the Norfolk-Virginia Beach-Newport News metropolitan area enables residents to utilize the numerous shopping centers and malls found in these urban centers.

The 1,680-acre Chippokes Plantation State Park and 19-acre Charles Steirly Heron Rookery provide fishing, swimming, boating, camping and picnic facilities.

# Lifestyle

Surry County is conveniently located to offer numerous recreational, historical and cultural opportunities. The 1,680-acre Chippokes Plantation State Park and the 19-acre Charles Steirly Heron Rookery provide fishing, swimming, boating, camping and picnic facilities. Additional fishing, boating, sunbathing and swimming can be found all along the James River. There are several beaches in Surry County with boat launching ramps. Creeks, rivers and ponds throughout the county have been stocked with a variety of fish that include large mouth bass, crappie, bream and pickerel.

Public recreation facilities include a community center, four tennis courts, one swimming pool, three boat ramps and four ball fields. Numerous championship golf courses can be found in Williamsburg and the Norfolk-Virginia Beach-Newport News and Richmond-Petersburg metropolitan areas.

For the history enthusiast, Surry County was settled in 1607 and has a wealth of stately old homes and plantations. Historical attractions include Smith's Fort Plantation built between 1751 and 1765; Bacon's Castle built in 1665; the Chippokes Plantation State Park, which is home to one of the oldest continuously working farms in the United States. Attractions there include the Jones-Steward Mansion and outbuildings dating to the early 1800's, the Chippokes Farm and Forestry Museum, a visitor center, swimming complex, camping area, picnic areas, formal English gardens, as well as biking and hiking trails.

The annual Pork, Peanut and Pine Festival held in July attracts over 75,000 visitors. This two-day event offers musical entertainment, exhibits, arts and crafts and a variety of specialty foods.

### I. Introduction

This report provides a community profile of Surry County. It is intended to complement the information found in our Virginia Workforce Connection application, which can be accessed online at:

www.VirginiaLMI.com

The report is divided into three major sections. The first contains a profile of regional demographic characteristics and trends, the second supplies similar information for the regional economy, and the third provides a profile of regional education characteristics.

### II. Demographic Profile

#### **Overview**

This Demographic Profile provides an in-depth analysis of the population in Surry County. Most of the data is produced by the U.S. Census Bureau, and includes demographic characteristics such as age, race/ethnicity, and gender.



#### **Related Terms and Definitions**

#### **Ability to speak English**

For people who speak a language other than English at home, the response represents the person's own perception of his or her ability to speak English. Because census questionnaires are usually completed by one household member, the responses may represent the perception of another household member.

#### Age

The age classification is based on the age of the person in complete years as of April 1, 2010. The age of the person usually was derived from their date of birth information. Their reported age was used only when date of birth information was unavailable.

#### Gender


The data on gender were derived from answers to a question that was asked of all people. Individuals were asked to mark either "male" or "female" to indicate their gender. For most cases in which gender was not reported, it was determined by the appropriate entry from the person's given (i.e., first) name and household relationship. Otherwise, gender was imputed according to the relationship to the householder and the age of the person.

#### Race

The concept of race as used by the Census Bureau reflects self-identification by people according to the race or races with which they most closely identify. The categories are sociopolitical constructs and should not be interpreted as being scientific or anthropological in nature. Furthermore, the race categories include both racial and national-origin groups.

**Please note**: In the past, our population by race/ethnicity data has always excluded the Hispanic ethnicity from each race category. Starting in January 2013, each race category now includes all ethnicities.



#### **Overview**

The Economic Profile of Surry County consists primarily of data produced by the Virginia Employment Commission, U.S. Census Bureau, and the Bureau of Labor Statistics.



#### **Related Terms and Definitions**

#### **Average Weekly Wage**

Computed as average quarterly wages divided by 13.

#### **Consumer Price Index (CPI)**

The Consumer Price Index measures the average change over time in the prices paid by urban consumers for a representative market basket of consumer goods and services.

#### **Local Employment Dynamics (LED)**

The Local Employment Dynamics Program at the Census Bureau, together with its state partners, provides employment information at the county, city, and Workforce Investment Area level. This information tracks workers in different industries by age and gender and provides statistics on job creation, separation, turnover, and wages.

# Quarterly Census of Employment & Wages (QCEW)

A federal/state cooperative program that collects and compiles employment and wage data for workers covered by state unemployment insurance (UI) laws and the federal civilian workers covered by Unemployment Compensation for Federal Employees (UCFE). These data are maintained at the state in micro and macro levels and also sent to BLS quarterly.

#### **Unemployment Insurance (UI)**


Unemployment insurance is a program for the accumulation of funds paid by employers to be used for the payment of unemployment insurance to workers during periods of unemployment which are beyond the workers' control. Unemployment insurance replaces a part of the worker's wage loss if he becomes eligible for payments.

#### **Unemployment Rate**

The number of unemployed people as a percentage of the labor force.







#### **Employment by Industry**





### New Hires by Industry



### Turnover by Industry







#### **Overview**

#### **Related Terms and Definitions**

#### **Associate's degree**

An award that normally requires at least two but less than four years of full-time equivalent college work.

#### **Bachelor's degree**

An award that normally requires at least four but not more than five years of full-time equivalent college-level work.

#### Post-baccalaureate certificate

An award that requires completion of an organized program of study equivalent to 18 semester credit hours beyond the bachelor's. It is designed for persons who have completed a bachelor's degree, but do not meet the requirements of a master's degree.

#### Master's degree

An award that requires the successful completion of a program of study of at least the full-time equivalent of one but not more than two academic years of work beyond the bachelor's degree.

#### Post-master's certificate

An award that requires completion of an organized program of study equivalent to 24 semester credit hours beyond the master's degree, but does not meet the requirements of academic degrees at the doctor's level.

#### **Doctor's degree**


The highest award a student can earn for graduate study.

#### First-professional degree

An award that requires completion of a program that meets all of the following criteria: (1) completion of the academic requirements to begin practice in the profession; (2) at least two years of college work prior to entering the program; and (3) a total of at least six academic years of college work to complete the degree program, including prior required college work plus the length of the professional program itself.





(Population 18 years and over)





